Mission Statement Review

Kersha reviewed the UB mission statement.

United for Brownsville is a family-led collaboration transforming the early childhood systems in Brownsville, Brooklyn, so that all young children are able to flourish. Our work starts with families' hopes for their children and their ideas for eradicating systemic inequities in early childhood services. This approach disrupts harmful power dynamics and beliefs rooted in anti-Black racism that prevent Black and Latinx children from lifting off.

Book Club

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- Tribeca Pediatrics UB hosted an event with the new pediatric office in the neighborhood and distributed 50 Learning Landscapes kits
- Brooklyn Book Bodega
 - UB distributed 43 kits at this event as well as Pampers
 - UB plans to partner with them again for a "Book Flood" event to bring 1001 diverse books into the community

- Discuss messaging to families that helps children progress through the enrollment process


• Other notes

- The first meeting was this week and included exciting new collaborators that can broaden the impact of improved EI access beyond what our EI Ambassador position can do.
- *Maria suggests to add Danny's contact information onto fliers at future events

• Child Tax Credit

- Ruth covered the creation of UB's effort to increase the receipt of Child Tax Credit Funds received by Brownsville families.
- We started by identifying the problem with marketing tools, outreach, and language.
- We then formed theories about why eligible families in Brownsville may not be accessing the CTC
- Between October 1st and November 15th, UB used the following tactics
 - Redesign and disseminate promotional materials

- FAB phone/text/email/social tree and contest
- In-person flyering at events and outside service providers
- Linkage to remote/in-person application assistance
- Encourage residents to tell a friend who isn't connected
- Ruth covered the below chart describing the difference in accepted CTC funds before UB began our efforts v. afterwards
- A total of \$366,600 was delivered in the 11212 zipcode between September 1st and November 15th
- The average estimated refund was \$4,582.50
- The median time between GetCTC to an accepted refund was 19.75 minutes



FAB Fellowship Pt. III Selection

- Ashanti Walker will be starting as our new FAB fellow instead of Bashirah Okeh, who forfeited her position as she believed Ashanti would be more fitting

Sensory Gym Concept

- A sensory gym can help transform Brownsville into a community that supports early childhood development
 - Connects to the Learning Landscapes original vision and Learning Neighborhoods idea of revitalizing unused community spaces
 - Supplies an inclusive all-weather playground, which has been mentioned by the FAB in multiple prior meetings
 - Revisits the idea of a Gymboree type space generated in prior FAB conversations
 - Connects to a need identified for spaces to host EI and other services
 - Occupational therapy needs in Brownsville are not able to be met because they are so far away and inaccessible by public transport
- Sensory Street is the closest example of this model and the backbone included a video of this venue.

- David took his son Auggie there which he truly enjoyed and wanted to return to
- Partially Funded by the state DOH through reimbursement
- Also offer paid classes where children can do activities, gym time, etc.
- Each activity is related to a specific skill children need to work on
- Educates training occupational therapists who can work with children hands on
- UB asked the group: What opportunities would a sensory gym bring to Brownsville?
 - Provides an opportunity for children to have a play area
 - Parents will be excited to bring their children there to help motivate parents to do activities outside of the home
 - All year/all weather play spaces are needed, especially in New york for our climate where kids can be comfortable and stimulated year-round
 - Ashanti adds it is important to make sure that special needs kids are prioritized
 - Adds a way for overweight children to move in a fun way
 - o Can be a place for alternative, culturally-centered learning
 - o Can act as a distribution center for LL kits, brown toy boxes, etc.
 - Can be used to add emphasis on STEM that is typically not accessible to Brownsville parents
- What kinds of activities would you like to see there?
 - Yoga
 - Tumbling
 - Playing fort structures
 - o Sand tables, sensory mats
 - Ages and stages activities
 - Rock climbing
 - STEM lessons
 - Dance lessons
 - o Culturally-centered language

- Non-english language classes, Audrey will share a free app she is aware of for this purpose

- Note on staffing
 - Athenia "I always caution away from volunteers as it sometimes devalues those who offer the services not paying them what they are worth. It is also not very long term sustainable especially in a community where people are already financially tapped."

 - Aviator has golf, ninja warrior, different interact
 - Marli Boxes and other Sensory Kits

• Livonia 4

- There is some potential for filling a part of the unoccupied commercial space at a building area at 368-72 Livonia Ave.
- The original plan for the space was to service justice involved youth, which was not well received by residents
- We believe that an early childhood oriented program may be much more easily digested by residents, developers, and other decision makers.
- UB Backbone has floated the idea of a sensory gym and multipurpose space to help combat the obstacles we have identified around EI in Brownsville
- Profitability is a key component to this business idea being successful.
 Multiple streams of revenue can come from CPSE and EI services,
 grants, insurance, non-profit subsidies, and more

Arguments for a Sensory Gym

- Sensory support is not in Brownsville at all but is plentiful in other more economically privileged area of Brooklyn
- Because play is a child's native language, they can express what is holding them back from growth
- Helping to make Brownsville self-sustainable so that families in Brownsville can work, play, and live all in the same neighborhood and lengthen the amount of time the Black dollar remains within our communities
- Doing something different to shift the narratives and stigma surrounding the Brownsville community
- Further create space for other organizations to come into Brownsville who have historically avoided it
- The opportunity to corner a formerly ignored market segment in the neighborhood with a strong demand as well as potential positive PR
- Allows a place where children with all levels of needs can interact

- Provide a welcoming, safe, and structured environment to re-socialize while coming out of COVID isolation for children and adults improving daily living and independence
- Increase patronage at local businesses
- Increases the quality of life of residents of the building and easy access to the offered services
- Increases the level of safety for neighborhood children by giving them a safe space away from neighborhood violence such as shootings
